The National Secretariate of Mining and Energy of the Solidarity Union, and the Heartland Institute reaffirm the concerns previously expressed in their joint declaration regarding the conclusions of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), which state that the world is facing a climate catastrophe. Both Parties of the Declaration see no justification for declaring a climate emergency, nor do not agree with the statements made by UN Secretary-General António Guterres that "the era of global **boiling** has arrived." In our opinion these actions create widespread fear and anxiety, especially among young people, without sufficient scientific validation at this point.

- We observe with great concern the ongoing efforts to create legislation that, under the guise of combating hate speech, seeks to stifle free expression regarding climate policy. The official interpretation presented by the IPCC is becoming the only acceptable narrative, reminiscent of the dystopian visions described by Orwell. The global energy mix does not depend on policies but on the availability of resources, technologies, and the wealth of societies striving to ensure a secure present and a sustainable future for themselves and future generations.
- The National Secretariate of Mining and Energy of the Solidarity Union, and the Heartland Institute strongly oppose actions aimed at completely eliminating coal from the global energy portfolio in light of the ongoing full-scale war in Ukraine, other conflicts, and the approaching winter. Increasing the share of renewable energy sources (RES) in the energy mix will not enhance security but will instead increase the risk of energy supply disruptions, or blackouts.
 - The National Secretariate of Mining and Energy of the Solidarity Union, and the Heartland Institute recognize that energy transformation means a dynamic process of developing energy production technologies and fostering innovation based on the rational management of natural resources while adhering to environmental protection principles. Therefore, energy transformation should never be understood as the elimination of coal as an energy source. The depletion of coal resources is a natural stimulus for seeking new energy generation technologies based on alternative energy resources. The decision to exclude coal can only be made when alternative, commercially viable energy production technologies are available on the market. This decision must not jeopardize the continuity of energy supplies at socially acceptable prices.
 - The parties declare mutual assistance in preparing for a referendum in which Poles will decide on the verification or suspension of the European Green Deal. Key actions in this area will include: preparing resources comprising analyses, assessments, forecasts, interviews, reports, and informational notes, as well as securing international support from the strongest member states. Appreciating the Heartland Institute's extensive experience in managing large international projects, we are convinced that such collaboration can significantly enhance the effectiveness of our efforts in the future.

 - Assessing the adaptation of military forces to changing climate conditions.
 - Reviewing the Heartland Institute's activities in the fields of environment, climate, and social policy.
 - The European Green Deal and its implementation effects. Assessing the possibility of expert support for technical and legal actions by Polish side in this regard, based on the experiences of similar cooperation between European environmental organizations and American NGOs.
 - The possibility of using American low-emission energy generation technologies and manufacturing components for the chemical, steel, and agricultural industries, as well as nuclear and other technologies.
 - The National Secretariat of Mining and Energy of the Solidarity Union and the Heartland Institute recognize participation in future scientific conferences and seminars organized by both parties as a priority action, declaring their willingness to collaborate in organizing such conferences.
